Message from UW Department Chair Greg Huang

Dear Alums,

The economic challenges facing the nation have been felt here in the state of Washington, where state revenues from sales taxes have decreased dramatically over the past several years. The state has found itself struggling to fund its many commitments, and higher education has taken tremendous cuts in state support. The UW, incredibly, has lost about 50% of its state funding in the past four years. While everyone expects the University of Washington to weather these cuts, all units have been affected, and everyone is being asked to do more with less. The reality, though, if the economic condition does not turn around, is we will have to do less with less. Not an attractive thought, as who wants to have half of their teeth cleaned, or only one arch straightened?

The School of Dentistry has been challenged to change its operating model. With state dollars dwindling, we must consider functioning more like a privately run dental school, and tuition is likely to rise accordingly. Although no one wants dental or orthodontic education to become elitist, neither do we wish for the dental school to become financially insolvent. We all witnessed the round of dental school closures that occurred in the 80's and 90's, and because we do not wish that to occur, we will need to change the way we do business in our Dental School and in our Department of Orthodontics. UW officials urge us to be creative, to find ways to weather this downturn, and to poise ourselves for recovery and re-emergence as stronger units in the next 10 - 20 years. All over the dental school, reorganization (to increase efficiency) is the buzzword. In our Department, all the faculty are teaching more. Our students will have to shoulder increased tuition. Administrative and clinical staffs are shrinking, and greater demands are being placed on those remaining.

In the midst of all this change, I believe it is imperative that we continue to provide the highest quality education and patient care. That is our mission and our tradition, and I am not willing to compromise on these issues. But some things will not receive the attention that they have in the past. Research time may become limited for faculty and students. This is a serious problem, as scholarship and discovery have also been a tradition of our department. Service to the dental school and to the profession will suffer too, as faculty have less time to volunteer their talents to local, regional, and national committees, councils, and organizations. We are fortunate that the alums have previously created and funded the Moore-Riedel Professorship, allowing us to add another faculty member to assist with the mission of the department. Currently, David Turpin is our Moore-Riedel Professor, and he has already begun directing courses and applying for grants. Additionally, he also serves on departmental, School of Dentistry, and other various committees (some internationally, like the World Federation of Orthodontists). Kudos to the UWOAA for their foresight, as well as to David, for his commitment to the Department and profession.

Despite the challenges I mentioned above, I am optimistic that the changes we face in the next few years will indeed allow us to transform our dental school into a stronger institution. One that is financially self-sustaining, and therefore, more immune to the fluctuations in the economy and spending habits of the state residents. Our Department is making a significant investment in our future – the remodeling of our clinic. Through the generosity of all of you, we are planning to start the renovation in March, 2011 This \$1.3 million project will modernize our clinic, creating an environment for patient care that matches the world-class reputation our Department has held for decades. The new clinic will transform our patients' experience. The reception area will be completely redesigned, creating a more inviting and welcoming atmosphere. The clinic will have two dedicated consultation rooms, so that treatment can be described thoroughly with the aid of digital records and other diagnostic and educational programs. The Jim Clark Imaging Center is being created to allow the transition to completely digital records. All the operatories will be completely renovated with new dental equipment, cabinets, and computers. Our clinic conference room will be expanded, becoming the primary meeting space for departmental seminars and courses. It will house updated audiovisual equipment, including computers that will be networked to the School of Dentistry servers, thus allowing instant access to all patient records for clinical conferences.

It is impressive that the funding for this project has not been accomplished by huge gifts from only a few individuals. Rather, this has been a grass-roots effort, spearheaded by Tim Shields. Here are a few facts about our clinic fundraising:

- Almost 200 of our UW alums have donated (about half our graduates)
- The largest single gift has been \$50,000
- Eight individuals have pledged over \$25,000
- The Class of 1983 has contributed the most (\$90,000), with the classes of 1995 (\$69,000) and 2000 (\$63,000) close behind
- Total pledged amount to date is about 1.2 million
- WE ARE WITHIN \$100,000 OF OUR TARGET !!!

What a great fundraising campaign Tim has led, and we thank him for all his efforts! As we approach the start date for the renovation, I would like to reach out to each and every one of our graduates, thanking you for your tremendous support, and asking for just a little more so that the clinic fundraising effort can reach a successful conclusion. Our UW educations have allowed us to have wonderful careers. In that spirit, we should all consider giving back so that the next generation of UW orthodontists can be educated in a modern, well-equipped clinic that conveys the sense of excellence that is the hallmark of our Department.

Contribution\$ Update...

Your continuous and generous contributions have been the foundation for Association support to the UW Orthodontic Department. Alumni have asked about how their contributions are received and credited by the Association. Here is a brief breakdown:

TYPES OF CONTRIBUTIONS

1. Contributions to the UW Orthodontic Alumni Association. Tax deductible checks are made out to the UWOAA and mailed directly to the Association. Credit toward "club" level is given upon receipt of the check. The donation may be directly from an alumnus or on the behalf of an alumnus by another person, such as a referring dentist. The donor receives tax credit and the alumnus receives club credit. The person contributing must indicate the name of the alumni member who should receive credit to their club level. Contact Joni Marts for "In lieu of" forms to facilitate others donating on your behalf.

2. Contributions directed to specific funds at the UW. Tax deductible checks are made out to the University of Washington and mailed to the Department of Orthodontics, specifying which fund the monies are to be directed (see below). The Fund Development Office then receives and processes these funds for the Department and reports their receipt to the UWOAA. The Association then gives Club credit to the UW alumni contributors. As above, another individual may donate on behalf of an alumnus directly to a specified fund and receive the tax deduction. Checks should be sent to the UW Orthodontic Department. Also, the donor should indicate which alumnus should receive credit for club status.

We are fortunate to be associated with incredibly talented alumni who have taken their knowledge to help others around the world. David Engst ('77) is one such orthodontist. David has captioned his photos as he shares some of his work experiences traveling the world to help the needy.

Waiting Crowd: This remote mountain village had never been visited by a dentist before. I was there six hours and , of course, was overwhelmed (Honduras central highlands)







June 30, 2009. I awoke to see the army, police, street fires outside my hotel. The military had abducted President Zelaya who is now in exile in the Dominican Republic. I bribed a taxi driver to get to the airport which was packed with Americans trying to get out. I arranged a first class ticket home. Foreigners were watching the coup on television. Hondurans were glued to the breaking news of Michael Jackson's death. One local said to me, "Whoever is president doesn't affect us, but Michael Jackson touched our lives." (Tegucigalpa, Honduras) Dental students in the developing countries are taught to never put your finger in the mouth while injecting due to HIV risk of a needle stick. This was especially important here. (Prison outside Playa del Carmen, Mexico)



This is deep into the Moskitia jungle and takes 3 tough days to travel there. This is a major exchange hub for Colombian drugs. We were escorted by the Honduran army in canoes up the river. No dentist has been here before. Most children had malaria and all children had parasites. Note the dirt floor of my "office." (La Moskitia, Honduras).



This is the brand new dental school in Phnom Penh. The faculty has only one western trained dentist and the only specialist is a pediatric dentist. I have given two workshops here on oral surgery. The students have never had an orthodontist give a lecture. Contact me if you would like to lecture here. (Phnom Penh, Cambodia)

Haitian refugee kids. There has been 100% unemployment in this community for 6 years. One main food staple is sugar cane. Kids have rampant decay. Note the clothes contributed by NGO's, mostly US charities. (North central Dominican Republic).



One of several body guards. One prospective patient was so intoxicated it took four guards to remove him from the clinic. He was the town mayor. (Honduras, northern highlands).





A veterinarian asked me to assist him with some oral surgery on this Rotweiller, "Max." (North central Dominican Republic).

FACULTY PROFILE: Dr. Heather Woloshyn



The UW Orthodontic Department has graduated some wonderful folks from our neighbors to the north. This year, we're delighted to focus on our own UWOAA Past-President, Heather Woloshyn.

This lovely Saskatchewan native had early and excellent examples in her own orthodontists: Drs. Paul Henderson and Jim Horn, both UW Orthodontic graduates. Added to that, Heather and her sister had best friends whose fathers worked in the dental field. 






