In 1980, Greg won the prestigious Milo Hellman award essay from the American Association of Orthodontists. He has reviewed in numerous scholarly journals, including the *AJO*, *Angle Orthodontist*, *Archives of Oral Biology*, and the *Journal of Dental Research*. He is a member of OKU and is a diplomate of the American Board of Orthodontics. In addition, Greg served for a number of years on the Study Section of the National Institute for Dental Research.
